One young man was wet, cold and rapidly descending into hypothermia. The team spent three quarters of an hour warming him up until an ambulance was available to take him to hospital. He could have died.

At 4.15 a.m. a team member on his way home from duty found a young woman, drugged, confused and hypothermic. The Street Pastors came out again and cared for her; eventually taking her to Barnstaple and delivering her into care.

Then it snowed! On the night the snow came down the taxis were off the roads before the clubs shut. Some clubbers had 10 - 15 miles to walk home in the snow and were only dressed for travelling by taxi (use your imagination!). The team stayed on until everyone was safely on their way wrapped up in space blankets and armed with lollipops for energy.
